More Than 46 U.S. Air Force Locations Worldwide Now Use TBMCS

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Lockheed Martin has delivered the latest Theater Battle Management Core System (TBMCS) Unit Level upgrade to U.S. Air Force bases worldwide. TBMCS provides air commanders with an integrated, internet-like capability to plan, direct, and control all theater air operations. This latest upgrade to the base level system will afford users with greater access to more command and control data as well as enhanced scheduling and resource management capabilities.
